

Work is All Play for FRES Children



Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work® Day celebrated its 20th Anniversary in 2013, and offices across Penn participated in this opportunity to introduce the children of University staff and faculty to the jobs their parents do every day. FRES designed two activities for children, and hosted

more than 40 boys and girls on April 25. A demonstration on Compost Tea introduced our visiting kids to one of the many ways this department helps to "green" Penn's Campus. Our very own "Landscape Whisperer" Bob Lundgren and Compost Co-host Chloe Cerwinka (photo above) showed how different types of organic waste and paper products are collected, sent to an off-site processing facility where they break down into a rich compost. Completing the cycle, the material returns to Penn where it is turned into a fertile "tea." The tea is then used as an all-natural, nutrient-dense spray on campus landscapes to build healthy soil. Our young guests also got to see worms at work in a compost sample, where they aerate soil and digest organic material that goes back into the soil. Many children planted sunflower or pea seeds in soil to take home and begin their own garden.

For kids who wanted to learn about energy, a tour of FRES' high-tech Operations Control Center was led by "Utilities Guru" Gerry McGillian. In this central hub of activity, the children learned how operators could monitor all of campus from just one space in FRES.

For the fourth year in a row, Penn has been named a Tree Campus USA. This national program was created in 2008 to honor colleges and universities for effective campus forest management and for engaging staff and students in conservation

goals. Penn achieved the title by meeting Tree Campus USA's five standards, which are met by these initiatives, among others:

- A Campus Tree Advisory Committee comprised of members representing the diverse audience of those with a stake in campus trees is established and meets regularly. This committee includes students, faculty, facility management and members of the community.
- A Campus Tree Care Plan has been produced with guidelines for campus development planning and sustainability efforts.
- Finances and personnel resources have been allocated for an annual work plan for tree planting, initial care, and ongoing management.
- Penn's Class of 2013 planted a Chestnut Oak on College Green as its Class Tree.

An Open House on April 19 marked the public opening of a world-class repository of the Library's original materials - manuscripts, printed books, visual materials, and artifacts. The new environmentally controlled facility will preserve the basic records of all fields of study, and serve the research needs of students, faculty, and researchers at Penn and beyond. Located in the heart of campus, the top-floor Special Collections Center offers striking views of College Green and the Philadelphia skyline. Four large areas of green roof contribute to the building's sustainability features, by absorbing rainwater, providing insulation, and helping to lower the urban air temperatures. Inside, the Class of 1978 Orrery Pavilion is a 140-seat assembly area with a state-of-the-art audio/visual system, currently one of the most technologically advanced lecture spaces on campus.

New Areas Under Construction

Summer Renovation Projects

Over the next few months, a number of major campus construction projects are ongoing or will be implemented over the summer, many to be completed before the academic year begins. Of particular note are:

- Streetscaping of

the 3200 block
of Walnut Street
and Highline
lighting

- Renovation of Student Registration and Financial Services in the Franklin Building
- Landscaping of the area between the Ringe squash courts and Franklin Field
- At River Fields, renovation of Rhodes soccer field and the placement of a new synthetic turf for field hockey, and
- Lower-level classroom renovation in Meyerson, as well as a refresh of the 2nd floor studio.

Residential renovations to be done over the summer include interior work in Gregory College House, with plans for new bathroom fixtures, and wall and floor finishes in rooms and corridors. Many building facades and classroom spaces as well will get upgrades over the summer months.

Singh Center for Nanotechnology Work Moves from Building to Courtyard



As work on the core facility wraps up, next steps have begun to complete this state-of-the-art building that marks the Eastern gateway to Penn's

campus. The Edison Building has been demolished, and in its place will rise a grassy courtyard and other sustainable landscaping. The well-known piece of campus art, "We Lost," will be placed there. Opening is anticipated for mid-Fall 2013.

NEW RETAIL ON CAMPUS



The shopping mix on campus expanded in February with **Greene Street**, a boutique consignment shop on Spruce Street near 38th Street. Accepting top-quality items in styles less than two years old, Greene Street offers an environmentally

sustainable clothing and accessories alternative to men and women looking to make changes to their wardrobes.

Gia Pronto moved to a larger storefront space in May, with a wider selection of menu offerings. Still located on the 3700 block of Spruce Street, just a few doors down from its prior location, Gia Pronto now sells brick-oven pizza and fresh baked goods. A custom-designed mural decorates the interior.

University Community Informs Retail Master Plan

More than 1,700 people filled out an online survey asking about Penn's current retail options - food, shopping and services - and a selection of others from campus and community showed up for a series of focus groups in April. All of this information will be used by the FRES Real Estate department in conjunction with its consultants to update the master plan for retail on campus. Last done in 2001, a real estate plan provides guidance for the mix of stores, restaurants, cafes, services, and vendors that lease space from Penn.

New Graduate and Professional Student Housing on the East End of Campus



Earlier this year, construction began on The Grove at Cira Centre South, a housing project targeted toward graduate and professional students, located at 30th and Chestnut Streets on a site leased from the University. The building, a joint project of Brandywine

Realty Trust, Campus Crest, and Harrison Street Real Estate Capital, will offer an 850-bed, upscale housing option opening in fall 2014. The tower, designed by architect Erdy McHenry in consultation with Cira master plan architect Cesar Pelli, is expected to achieve LEED Gold certification.

The series began this year with the *Brooklyn Qawwali Party* on Saturday, May 25 at 6 PM. Be sure to stop by and enjoy the entertainment on



Arts Funding Won by The Rotunda

The Rotunda has won a grant from the Knight Foundation to produce *Sanctuary*, a project that will bring a selection of experimental, avant-garde, improv musicians into the Sanctuary of The Rotunda for a two-week site-specific residency. Challenged to treat the space itself as an instrument, the project will culminate in public concerts composed for the giant open space.

Knight Foundation invests in artistic excellence, funding arts projects that engage the Knight resident communities in collective cultural experiences. Philadelphia is one of eight communities where the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation offer these grants.



From Fall 2013 to Spring 2014, The Rotunda will partner with Project Theater Project to produce the school edition of the hit Broadway musical *Avenue Q*. High school student performers will be paired with Penn students who will act as mentors, assisting with the learning of lyrics and dialogues, stage presence, costume, and explorations of topics within the show. Funding for this project has come from the Provost's Interdisciplinary Arts Fund. In the award letter from the Art and Culture Steering Committee of the Office of the Provost, this school production of *Avenue Q* was called "an exciting and important project, one with great potential to bring together a wide range of Penn and community partners in exactly the way envisioned by the Fund." Third Annual Tree Giveaway Helps to "Green" Philly

In partnership with the City of Philadelphia Department of Parks & Recreation, Penn offered free yard trees to staff and faculty of the



University and UPHS who live within the city limits. In this third year of the Creating Canopy program, more than 100 trees were distributed and now will "green" Philly in city residents' front lawns and backyards. Volunteers from the Morris Arboretum were on hand to help people select the species of tree that would work best for them in their own yard. Jason Lubar, Associate Director of Urban

Forestry at the Morris Arboretum, demonstrated the proper tree planting technique, using compost and mulch (pictured). FRES Attains Level 3 Green Office Certification

FRES has been certified as a Level 3 Green Office under Penn's [Green Office Certification](#) Program. The program certifies offices at levels 1 through 4 based on action the office has taken to reduce energy use, waste generation, increase green purchasing, promote sustainable commuting, and involve employees in green activities. Some of the interesting actions FRES has undertaken include managed print (we were one of the early offices on campus to utilize a managed print system), a very high amount of green purchasing - the highest at Penn, and recognizing staff for environmental stewardship. FRES is now working on attaining Level 4 certification, so you may have noticed some changes, including some new motion sensors in key places.
